A more understandable translation would read: "I solemnly urge you: proclaim the message; be persistent whether the time is favorable or unfavorable; convince, rebuke, and

encourage, with utmost patience in teaching." (2 Timothy 4:1b-2 RSV) Now that makes a little more sense, huh? Proclaim the message whether the "time" is favorable or not! Paul goes on to explain beginning in verse 3: "For the time is coming when people will not put up with sound doctrine, but having itching ears, they will accumulate for themselves teachers to suit their own desires, and will turn away from listening to the truth and wander away to myths." (2 Timothy 4:3-4 RSV) Sound familiar?! Yeah! If there ever was a couple of verses that could accurately describe the nature of the church in America today, there they are! Truth is not popular these days...but that doesn't change the need for it to be proclaimed...wherever our path leads us...school or community. Be faithful church! Shalom.

A NOTE FROM MARY



Studying in Acts, our conversation on Monday mornings lately has had a lot to do with bringing people together. While both Jews and Gentiles in the early church were in agreement in their confession that Christ is Lord, they had vastly differing views on how to express that. Yes, even the early church had disagreements! And so the question was asked: How *do* people of varying beliefs, experiences, and preferences come together in worship and fellowship? How do we become one in spite of all of our differences? I think it is particularly relevant in this day. So how does unity happen? Yes, it is definitely a miraculous work of the Spirit; however, in Acts we see believers making concessions to others so that both Jewish and Gentile believers could be one. And on at least one occasion we see Paul make concessions even on the subject of circumcision, a subject which he was passionate about when it came to Gentile converts.

And so we have had to ask ourselves: What preferences am I willing to give up in order for others to know Christ? Am I willing to give up my favorite place on the pew? Am I willing to support a ministry intended to reach others but which I do not personally benefit? Am I willing to sing a song that is not one of my favorites? Am I welcoming to those who are different? Am I willing to concede being "right" in order that others might know Christ? Where does compromise end and hypocrisy begin (Yeah, we're still wrestling with that one!)?

These are hard questions, but they are questions worth wrestling. When the world seems divided, where are you willing to compromise in order to show God's love? I don't pretend to know the answers, and I'm still wrestling with the questions myself; however, I know that the love of God rests in the middle of it all.
