# A NOTE FROM MARY



Music is made up of notes that are consonant and dissonant. Consonant notes are pleasant to the ear; they go together easily. They don't require much attention in listening. Dissonant notes are a bit more challenging to the ear; they clash. Sometimes they are almost offensive to the ear. While I don't want to oversimplify things, historically, in Western music, dissonance notes resolve. Notes move from consonance to dissonance and back. And it is that movement that makes beautiful music. Constant consonance, while easy on the ear, becomes boring. On the other hand, dissonance makes the listener pay attention. It requires more of us, but it also makes harmonies hat are beautiful and interesting. Dissonance is often what propels music into key changes. It moves the music forward. Our ears wait and anticipate the harmonic resolution.

I think that the Church is meant to be the same. If we were all alike, it might be easy; however, sometimes easy is boring. Easy doesn't propel us forward. Instead, the Spirit weaves together people from differing backgrounds, people at differing life stages, people who are gifted differently, people who have different passions. Sometimes, we are consonant and comfortable. Sometimes our differences lead to dissonance, and we must carefully pay attention to each other. We are forced to listen more intently. Sometimes the dissonance propels us forward into change. And we work and move together toward renewed consonance.

It's interesting to note that differing cultures have differing opinions about what sounds are consonant and dissonant. And it is amazing when styles combine to make something new, particularly because we do it so infrequently. In coming days, as you hear things and encounter people who are challenging, listen carefully. It may be that, as we seek resolution, we are propelled forward into something new and beautiful.

#### STEWARDSHIP OF FINANCES

Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCDs) are more valuable than ever. With the doubling of the standard deduction and the suspension and limitation of many other deductions, far fewer taxpayers are likely to itemize. This means that far fewer will be able take advantage of the deduction for charitable giving. With a QCD, you can use the standard deduction and get a tax break for your charitable contributions. Is a QCD right for you? You must be age 70 ½ and the funds from your IRA must go directly to a qualified charity. You are also limited to \$100,000 annually.
